

## LOUISIANA BOARD OF REGENTS 2005-2006 INSTITUTIONAL REPORT FOR THE PREPARATION OF TEACHERS OUR LADY OF HOLY CROSS COLLEGE

#### Message from the Commissioner:

The Board of Regents is proud of all the teacher preparation programs in our state that reached out to restore education in Louisiana after the devastation of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. The storms displaced over 84,000 university students, 176,000 K-12 students, 12,000 K-12 teachers, and 1.3 million citizens during fall 2005. The outreach by university faculty and their pre-service teachers was unprecedented. Displaced pre-service teachers were welcomed into new university environments and provided basic essentials to resume their education; pre-service teachers volunteered their time in shelters and helped deliver enrichment programs to displaced children; pre-service teachers assisted overcrowded schools deliver instruction to children who were experiencing emotional turmoil due to unimaginable losses; and displaced student teachers were welcomed into K-12 schools in new communities and provided clothing and housing to help them graduate on time. Of equal importance, faculty who lost their homes, personal belongings, and professional resources returned to their universities and joined in efforts to locate their displaced university students and rebuild the educational programs on their damaged campuses. The compassion and dedication demonstrated by teacher preparation faculty and pre-service teachers during this past year will not be forgotten.

#### **Mission of University**

The mission of Our Lady of Holy Cross (OLHCC) is to participate in the teaching mission of the Catholic Church in the spirit of the Marianites of Holy Cross by educating the minds and the hearts of its students through dedicated and creative teaching for responsible service to the human family; by seeking truth, goodness, and beauty through critical thinking, dialog, and research, and by serving the community through effective stewardship and generous sharing of its time, talents, treasures, as well as its spiritual and material resources.

#### **Student Characteristics of University**

During fall 2004, the university had a total enrollment of 1189 undergraduate and 113 graduate students. A total of 281 students were males and 1021 were females. The majority of the students were from Louisiana with a total of 1279 in-state students, 24 out-of-state students, and 0 foreign students. Among students enrolled in the undergraduate program, 179 were black, 895 were white, and 115 were other races. Among students enrolled in the graduate program, 30 were black, 60 were white, and 23 were other races.

#### Accreditation and Approval of Teacher Preparation Program

The university is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS). In addition, the university is accredited by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education (NCATE). All of the university's teacher preparation programs are approved by the Board of Regents and the Louisiana Department of Education.

#### Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program

Hurricane Katrina wielded its dangerous winds upon us and life as we knew it at OLHCC changed. Classes had begun for one week in the fall of 2005 after which no classes were held until January of 2006. Student teaching placements were held in abeyance, as were PLEP I and PLEP II (pre-student teaching) placements until the new year. The fall 2005 semester became known as the mid-winter semester and the spring semester became the spring/summer semester of2006. Every effort has been made to ensure that those students who planned to graduate in education in May of 2006 will be able to graduate in August of 2006. Many creative ways to accomplish the intent of all clinical hours were brainstormed and our students were the beneficiaries of this work. With hard work, creativity and many hours of collaborative planning on the part of the faculty, OLHCC teacher candidates will move forward at their normal pace. In addition, the work of the education faculty with the community continues on as evidence below.

# Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program (Cont'd)

- The concept of professional development schools (PDS) continues to be an important component of the OLHCC pre-service program. OLHCC has a collaborative with both Hart and Estelle elementary schools, both in Jefferson Parish. Reading clinics continued last year in both schools, and this year, a reading clinic is in place at Hart, and a new mathematics clinic is in place at Estelle Elementary School. Both of these ventures demonstrate a mutually beneficial relationship: our pre-service teachers garner more clinical experience and the at-risk students gain one-on-one assistance in their area of need.
- A collaborative that is growing is the Archdiocesan Teachers Institute (ATI) program in which OLHCC offers pre-methods courses to Catholic school teachers in convenient off-campus settings in an effort to work closely with the Archdiocese to gain certification for all teachers. The teachers receive their courses at a greatly reduced tuition. Registration for this program takes place at the end of May. It is anticipated that the registrants this summer will fall in the range of 90-100 teachers seeking certification. This program, begun two years ago, has been embraced by the teachers of the archdiocese. OLHCC sees this as a true college/K-12 partnership.
- OLHCC has formed a brand new partnership. It is with the Algiers Charter School Association (ACSA) of Orleans Parish. OLHCC participated in testing all prospective K-12 teachers in these new charter schools in mathematics and in writing, Our pre-service faculty graded these tests, providing ACSA with a listing of teachers from whom to further interview for teaching positions in the schools. OLHCC administration offers the College as a site for numerous meetings of the teachers and administrators. The Acting Dean of Humanities, Education and Counseling (newly named as the Vice President and Dean for Academic Affairs) currently serves as the President of the ACSA Board. This collaboration has moved to a grant-writing venture, which led to approximately 20 ACSA teachers planning to participate in the Educational Leadership Program in the fall of 2006 in an effort to 'grow our own' principals. Collaboration has proven to be a highly valuable process for OLHCC and the surrounding communities in the 2005-2006 academic year.

## OUR LADY OF HOLY CROSS COLLEGE

In compliance with the Higher Education Act of 1998, Louisiana created a Teacher Preparation Accountability System to assess the performance of teacher preparation programs within the state. During the first phase (2001-2002) of the accountability system, the performance of the regular and alternate certification students on the state teachers' examination (PRAXIS) was assessed. During subsequent phases (2002-2003, 2003-04, and 2004-05), the quantity of program completers at each institution and the performance of each institution (e.g., performance of regular and alternate certification students on the state teachers' examination (PRAXIS) and ratings by teachers of their satisfaction with their teacher preparation programs) were assessed. In the future, additional factors will be assessed to examine such areas as ratings of programs by first year teachers' mentors and growth of learning of students taught by new teachers. The purpose of this accountability system is to clearly demonstrate to the public that all universities and colleges in Louisiana are working diligently to produce quality teachers who work effectively with PK-12 students.

During 2005-06, it was not possible to implementation the Teacher Preparation Accountability System due to the closure of universities and schools in Louisiana and the inability to collect data from displaced teachers and mentors due to Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita. However, quantity and PRAXIS examination passage rate data that can be collected are being disseminated to the public in a 2005-06 Institutional Report for the Preparation of Teachers.
