Message from the Commissioner:

We in the Louisiana education community are pleased to offer the following reports on Louisiana's public and private university teacher education programs. These reports are an integral component of our continuing efforts to inform Louisiana's citizens about the quality of our teacher preparation programs. Last year, the first factor used in our accountability program was released – student passage rates on the teacher certification examination (PRAXIS). This year, as promised, the formula has been expanded to make the scores an even more meaningful catalyst for continued reform. For 2002-2003, the scores have been calculated using a weighted formula that takes into account each institution's regular and alternate certification completer rate (with extra points for completers who meet definitions for identified shortage areas), the PRAXIS examination passage rate, and the score on a survey measuring completer satisfaction. Teacher preparation accountability is just one of the many benefits Louisiana is reaping from partnerships that have been created between universities and school districts to recruit, prepare, and retain teachers. Our goal is to provide every child in Louisiana caring and qualified teachers in every class every year – to ensure that truly no child is left behind.

Mission of University

The mission of Louisiana College is to prepare students for a changing world by offering an educational program grounded in the liberal arts tradition, informed by the Christian faith, and committed to academic excellence.

Student Characteristics of University

During Fall 2002, Louisiana College had a total enrollment of 1,204 undergraduate students. A total of 506 students were males and 698 were females. The majority of the students were from Louisiana with a total of 1,168 in-state students, 27 out-of-state students, and 9 foreign students. Among students enrolled in the undergraduate program, 105 were black, 1,051 were white, and 48 were other races.

Accreditation and Approval of Teacher Preparation Program

Louisiana College is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. All of the university's teacher preparation programs are approved by the Louisiana Department of Education.

Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program

- Louisiana College is a private coeducational college of liberal arts and sciences, operated under the auspices of the Louisiana Baptist Convention. Located in Pineville, it is in the center of the state and easily accessible from major interstates, highways, and the Alexandria International Airport.
- Louisiana College teacher education graduates excel in passing the PRAXIS (National Teacher Exam). Ninety-eight percent of them have passed the test since it was first required in Louisiana during 1979. The job market for education graduates from Louisiana College remains very strong.
- Louisiana College has been recognized for having two teacher preparation graduates who have achieved National Certification.
- The college recruits highly qualified faculty who value effective teaching and learning, who are engaged in scholarly and creative activity, and who are committed to their own professional development. With its small classes, individualized instruction, empathetic advising, and personal attention, the college provides students with a quality education experience.
- Louisiana College offers a Practitioner Teacher Program called TEACH for noncertified teachers with a bachelor's degree, a 2.5 grade point average, appropriate PRAXIS scores, and employment in the area of certification. The 18 – 30 hour program is designed for those who wish to participate in an intensive summer program, seminars during the fall and spring, and an internship while working full time as a teacher in a school.

Notable Features and Accomplishments of Teacher Preparation Program (Cont'd)

- Louisiana College distributes nearly \$4 million annually in federal and state funds and private scholarships to more than 90% of its students.
- Louisiana College is one of the most recognized colleges in the south. Louisiana College was ranked 20th under Comprehensive Colleges – Bachelor's (Southern Region) in the 2003 issue of U.S. News and World Report's America's Best Colleges.
- The Christian faculty is noted for the personal attention it pays to individual students in small classes.
- Louisiana College was recently recognized for leadership in the field of student character development in *The Templeton Guide: Colleges that Encourage Character Development*. Louisiana College is profiled in the Faculty and Curriculum Programs section for its Values Program.
- Louisiana College was recognized in the 2002 2003 issue of America's 100 Best Christian Colleges.
- "Teach for Christ" is a student service organization that is sponsored through the teacher preparation department. It is the largest organization on campus.
- Louisiana College challenges students, faculty, and staff to grow both in knowledge and faith.
- Affirming the proposition that all truth is one and that all truth is God's truth, the college is committed to the task of integrating faith.

LOUISIANA BOARD OF REGENTS 2002-2003 TEACHER PREPARATION ACCOUNTABILITY SYSTEM

LOUISIANA COLLEGE

In compliance with the Higher Education Act of 1998, Louisiana created a Teacher Preparation Accountability System to assess the performance of teacher preparation programs within the state. During the first phase (2001-2002) of the accountability system, the performance of regular and alternate certification students on the state teachers' examination (PRAXIS) was assessed. During the second phase (2002-2003), the quantity of program completers at each institution and the performance of each institution (e.g., performance of regular and alternate certification students on the state teachers' examination (PRAXIS) and ratings by teachers of their satisfaction of their teacher preparation programs) are being assessed. In the future, additional factors will be assessed to examine such areas as: ratings of programs by first year teachers' mentors; retention of teachers after three years of teaching; and university-district partnerships. The purpose of this accountability system is to clearly demonstrate to the public that all universities and colleges in the state are working diligently to produce quality teachers who work effectively with PK-12 students.


This is a difference of **0%** when compared to the **93%** passage rate of 2000-2001 regular and alternate certification program completers on the PRAXIS examinations.

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

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS FOR TEACHER PREPARATION PROGRAMS

All regular and alternate certification students must pass the following PRAXIS subtests to be formally admitted to a teacher preparation program at a college or university in Louisiana. Regular students are those who are completing a program of study to graduate with a baccalaureate degree in education. Alternate certification students are those who already possess a baccalaureate degree outside of education and are completing an alternate certification program to become certified to teach.

Type of Assessment: Basic Skills

- (1) Communications Skills and General Knowledge **OR**
- (2) Reading, Writing, and Mathematics

State law requires all students to take all required PRAXIS subtests prior to graduation, but it does not require students to pass the subtests. Individual institutions have developed their own policies that require students to pass the PRAXIS subtests to graduate.

TEACHER CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS IN LOUISIANA

To be certified to teach in Louisiana, individuals must complete an approved teacher preparation program, possess a 2.5 grade point average, pass the Basic Skills subtests, and pass PRAXIS subtests in the following areas:

- Type of Assessment:Professional Knowledge(1)Professional Knowledge
 - (2) Principles of Learning & Teaching K-6 **OR**

OR

(3) Principles of Learning & Teaching 7-12

AND

Type of Assessment: Academic Content Areas

The subtests vary according to the areas of certification.

REQUIREMENTS OF THE HIGHER EDUCATION ACT OF 1998

The Higher Education Act of 1998 requires all institutions in the United States with teacher preparation programs to issue institutional reports on a yearly basis that contain information specified by the U.S. Department of Education. In addition, the Act requires institutions to provide the public with specific information pertaining to the passage rates of regular program completers on individual subtests. The following pages contain a report developed by the Educational Testing Service to provide a breakdown of program completer performance on individual subtests. A similar report is currently being developed by the Educational Testing Service regarding the performance of 2001-2002 alternate certification program completers on individual subtests. APPENDIX B

2002-2003 GRADUATE SATISFACTION SURVEY

LOUISIANA COLLEGE

INTRODUCTION

To assist the State in collecting data from first year teachers about their preparation for teaching, the Louisiana Department of Education sent surveys to the 807 regular program completers of the 2001-2002 academic year who began teaching during fall 2002. One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six individuals completed regular teacher preparation programs in public and private universities in Louisiana between July 1, 2001 and June 30, 2002. Of those 1,776 individuals, it was determined that 592 were not teaching in public schools in Louisiana, 377 began teaching in Louisiana's public schools during fall 2002. The survey instrument was sent to all of these 807 teachers. Ninety-two percent (n = 741) of the 807 teachers responded to the survey. Additional follow-up is currently in progress to obtain responses from the remaining 8% (n = 66).

The survey was developed by a committee composed of university, district, Louisiana Department of Education, and Board of Regents personnel. It was the committee's decision to align all survey questions with state standards for teachers (e.g., Louisiana's Components of Effective Teaching). Teachers were required to respond to 35 statements using a 4-point scale (i.e., Strongly Disagree = 1, Disagree = 2, Agree = 3, and Strongly Agree = 4). Each item is scored on this 1 to 4 scale, and the scores for the 35 items are added together for a total survey score. If a respondent answers each question, the minimum possible score is 35, and the maximum possible score is 140. A deadline for responding was provided to teachers. A second survey was sent to teachers who did not respond by the deadline.

The Board of Regents approved a policy during March 2003 to use survey scores during a given year as part of the Teacher Preparation Accountability System only if 10 or more individuals from a university or college responded to the survey. For institutions with fewer than 10 survey responses, data from consecutive years will be combined until a total of 10 or more surveys are available.

GRADUATE SATISFACTION GRADES

BASELINE SCORE

A Baseline Score has been established for each individual teacher preparation program in Louisiana. The Baseline Score is the total number of regular and alternate program completers that completed teacher preparation programs between the dates of July 1, 2000 – June 30, 2001. The Baseline Score for this university is: 14.

QUANTITY SCORE

A. 2001-2002 PROGRAM COMPLETERS

One-point is assigned to every regular and alternate certification program completers that completed teacher preparation programs between the dates of July 1, 2001 - June 30, 2002. The total number of regular and alternate program completers for this university is: **60**.

B. BONUS POINTS

In addition, one-half a point is assigned for every 2001-2002 regular and alternate program completer who meets the criteria for each of the following teacher shortages. The bonus points for this institution are: **15**.

Quantity Score = 60 (Program Completers) + 15 (Bonus Points) = 75

The +435.7% difference between the Quantity Score (75) and Baseline Score (14) converts to a scaled score of 140. The grade is A+.
